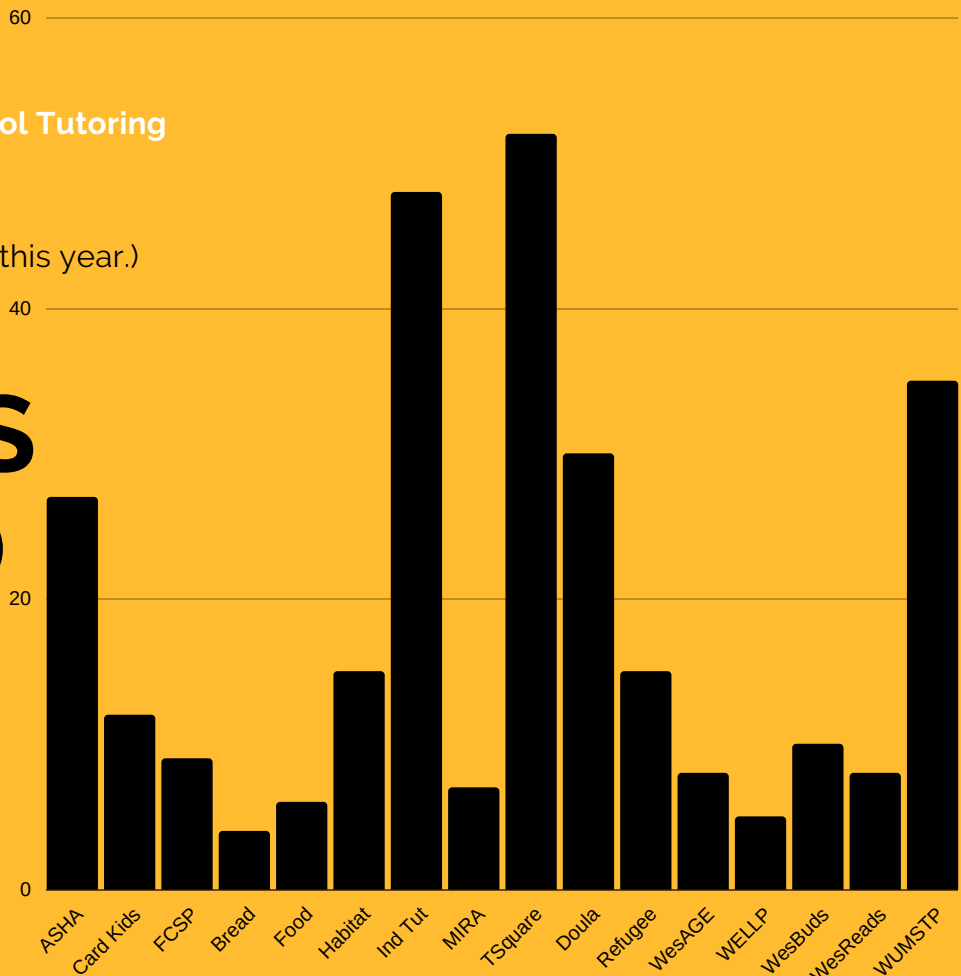
STUDENT COORDINATORS

EMPLOYMENT

Our Office employed about 147 students this academic year through our student programming, as van drivers, as office staff, or as support staff at one of four community organizations. Most of those students earn Work-Study funds through working with our office.

VOTING

This year, we partnered with NESAC Votes and the All-In Challenge to find ways to incentivize voter registration and voting. In collaboration with student political groups, we co-hosted registration events, debate watch parties, connected students to local campaigns, and hosted a panel on voting and criminal justice reform. Together, we registered hundreds of students and helped reach record student turn out at Beckham Hall's polling location in November. We estimate over 500 students were registered and/or voted with our help this year..
